I think I should share with you my feelings about today and the future of Royal Arch Masonry in Worcestershire.

I am very proud to be a Worcestershire Freemason. Freemasonry has given me so much over the last 37 years and to have the opportunity to give something back is a great privilege.

I firmly believe that The Holy Royal Arch is a very important Order in Freemasonry and serves a pivotal role in the whole Masonic structure.

It places the teachings of the 3 Craft Degrees into the context of our relationship with God and in that sense completes the Third Degree. But it also provides the foundation for our further investigation and discoveries along the road to Masonic Light or in today's terms the Meaning of Life.

We must all strive for a better understanding of our Order – its important principles and messages. Only then can we with enthusiasm encourage Brethren to join us and remain with us.

We must take this Supreme Order seriously, to practice our ritual with due solemnity, its messages are weighty and significant, but this will not prevent our meetings from being happy, cheerful and relaxed, rather it should enhance our pleasure in them.

Whenever I return from a Masonic Meeting my wife asks me “Did you have a good evening?”

My aim, Companions, is that when you are asked that question on your return the answer will be:

“Good ceremony, good Candidate, good companionship – a really good night!”

We can only achieve this through an increased understanding of this Order and a willingness to enjoy it.

Companions I believe that this Order will only flourish if the members of it experience enjoyment from both the ritual and the companionship.

You will not be surprised that I do not have a great list of new initiatives to announce today but my Executive and I are already planning new programmes and events designed to increase understanding, involvement and enjoyment for all of us.

I see the Worcestershire Installed First Principals Chapter as a key channel of communication within the Province and aim to make a number of announcements at our Meeting in June.

Companions I feel very proud and honoured to serve you as your Grand Superintendent.

I will do everything in my power to ensure that Royal Arch Masonry flourishes in the Province of Worcestershire.

I look forward to meeting with you in your Chapters and with your support we will enjoy the unique Companionship that only Royal Arch Masonry can bring.
